Risk Assessment

You are legally required to complete risk assessments and review them regularly. It is <u>your</u> responsibility to demonstrate to the Ofsted Inspector that your home is a safe and suitable environment for the children in your care.

This document is not a risk assessment in itself. It is a guide to what you should include in you risk assessment. It makes <u>suggestions</u> only; every home will have individual safety issues. You should refer to the Welfare Requirements within the Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage. Once you have identified the risks use the template provided.
